New England Churchillians Summer Picnic and Historic Uniforms Viewing

This year's picnic will be held at Coldstream House in Stoddard, New Hampshire, about two hours from Boston and Hartford. Our host, M.C. Tsen, will display for us his incomparable collection of 600 British military uniforms and accoutrements. This will be only the second time in 10 years that the collection has been offered for public viewing.

Among items on display at the picnic will be a Blue Patrol jacket of the 4th Hussars, Winston Churchill's cavalry regiment (he is shown above as a subaltern in 4th Hussars Full Dress uniform); a helmet that belonged to Lord Digby, maternal grandfather of the present Winston Churchill; and Field Marshal Alexander's field uniform made by the appointed Italian court tailor for Alexander shortly after his 1944 entry into Rome.

Coldstream House and Stoddard

Coldstream House, home of Mr. and Mrs. M.C. Tsen, was built circa 1830 and stands on 35 mostly wooded acres with a beautiful garden situated on a prospect in the rural town of Stoddard.

Stoddard is in the Southwestern corner of New Hampshire on land granted in 1752 to its namesake, Colonel Sampson Stoddard of Chelmsford, Massachusetts and others as Monadnock Number 7. Once known as Limerick, it was incorporated as Stoddard in 1774. Between 1840 and 1873, Stoddard was a center of glass manufacturing. According to Federal censuses, Stoddard had 701 residents in 1790 and 931 in 2000. Its population is now believed to exceed 1,000.



M.C. Tsen and his British Military Uniforms Collection

M.C. Tsen is a passionate student of British military history and a recognized expert on 19th and 20th Century British military uniforms and accoutrements. He is often consulted by museum directors concerning matters on British military history and shares his vast knowledge with fellow collectors and friends.



Mr. Tsen's love of British military history began at English boarding school when he experienced many military pageantries, including the Queen's Coronation Procession. After coming to America and graduating from Virginia Military Institute, he often traveled on business through London where he formed many friendships with military tailors of Savile Row and began to acquire the core of his own collection of British military uniforms, originally from 1880's to 1914, but now extended through WWII.

The collection is the outgrowth of the core of uniforms purchased from the London tailors by Mr. Tsen with additional purchases from auctions in Britain over many years. It encompasses complete sets of uniforms of the British army, the Royal Navy, the RAF, as well as Court and Civil Dress. The original charter of the collection covered the late Victorian period, about the 1880's, to the First World War in 1914. Lately, because of the increasing difficulty in obtaining early materials, it has been extended to the Second World War and even more recent years.

The aim of the collection is to preserve the uniforms of the different British Services as well as different Orders of Uniforms within the same Service. The objective is to make each uniform, with all the necessary insignia and accoutrements, as complete as possible. At the same time, the historical owners of the uniforms are researched with the help of Officers' Lists and *Who Is Who* whenever tailors' labels

Directions to Coldstream House

From Boston and Eastern Massachusetts (about 100 miles from Boston):

- Take I-93 North to I-89 at Concord, New Hampshire.
- Take I-89 North to US-202/NH-9 West (Exit 5—the exit is on your left).
- Take US-202/NH-9 West toward Keene/Henniker.
- Stay on NH-9 when US-202 splits from NH-9.
- Turn right at NH-123 North (about 15 miles beyond Hillsborough) and proceed just under 3 miles to Stoddard Center. You'll see a Neo-Gothic church directly ahead (behind a Civil War statue). Before you come to this, Town Hall will be on right and Coldstream House on left. Look for Churchill signage and park along side of road.

From Hartford and Western Massachusetts (about 120 miles from Hartford):

- Take I-91 North through Massachusetts into Vermont to Exit 3 (Keene, NH/Brattleboro)
- Take VT-9 East across Connecticut River; it becomes NH-9.
- Stay on NH-9 East through Keene, continue on NH-9 about 14 miles until it becomes NH-9 East/NH-123 North.
- Proceed 1 mile and turn left at NH-123 North as it splits from NH-9 East; follow directions above from Boston.
